The National Black History Month in February celebrates the contributions that African Americans have made to American History. American historian and author, Dr. Carter G. Woodson, established Black History Week and its first celebration which occurred on February 12, 1926. For many years, the second week of February was set aside for this celebration to coincide with the birthdays of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln, two key figures in the history of African Americans. In 1976, as part of the nation's bicentennial, the week was expanded to a month. Since then, U.S. presidents have proclaimed February as National Black History Month.
