

Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) Overview

The federal Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) program provides benefits to individuals whose employment or self-employment was lost/interrupted due to a disaster (that results in a Presidential major disaster declaration).

When DUA is available in Maryland, it will be announced on MDunemployment.com. Apply for DUA within 60 days of this announcement.

Eligibility Requirements and Benefit Payments

If eligible, you may receive up to 26 weeks of DUA. In Maryland, and the maximum DUA weekly benefit amount (WBA) is \$430. The minimum is half of the state's average WBA (for 2024, the Maryland average was \$383. The minimum may change).

You may be eligible for DUA if you:

- lived, worked/were scheduled to work in the disaster area (at the time of the disaster); and,
- as a direct result of the disaster, either:

have been unemployed for at least one week (since the disaster began);

are unable to reach your place of employment;

were scheduled to start work and the job no longer exists;

became the major financial supporter because the head of the household died (as a direct result of the disaster);

cannot work because of an injury (caused as a direct result of the disaster.
